
Sports Days - 4th and 5th June 2024









Reception read and learnt their core text 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt.' They then innovated their own version, adding in the different animal habitats they had been learning about. They created art around the innovated habitats, published their own fact files and painted watercolours of the animals they would find when 'Going on an Animal Hunt.'





Year 2

Last half term, we learnt about Anansi tales. Our core text was Anansi and the Golden Pot by Taiye Selasi. In the story, the main character was called Anansi who was visited by a cheeky spider who taught Anansi the importance of sharing and being kind to others. We used this story to write our own Anansi folktales.





Last term in writing, year 1 explored the topic of pirates. Our core text for the topic was 'How to Find Gold.' We used our knowledge from the book to create a finding story of our own character going on a journey to find gold. In DT, the children had so much fun creating their own pirate ships linked to our spider's topic. We used our knowledge of sliders to create our own boat inspired by our core text, as well as sea animals.



Sunny day there was girl called sparkle, she a Loved to play on her bike in her garden with her pet who was a Cheeky cat called Max. Max likes to eat pears every Morning, But they dedicd to go on an adventure. Sparkle and Max made a Map and a big brown boat, and it was spoty and dark blue.

Last term in year 3, our core text was called 'Journey.' This book is all about a young girl who finds a magical red crayon and draws a doorway to anywhere she wants. Journey is a picture book; this meant the children had to be picture detectives on each page to find out what was happening. The girl is forced to overcome a multitude of different obstacles challenges. and After familiarising ourselves with the book, we wrote our own narratives where our character finds a magical pen create doorways to anywhere in the world. Our characters had to overcome numerous challenges to find their way back home such as an evil emperor.


Year 3

Year 4 were inspired by the legendary David Attenborough, crafting a non-chronological report on endangered animals, unravelling the mysteries of the animal kingdom while confronting the daunting challenge of climate change. They reflected on the tough question: What can we do to stop climate change? and thought about the impact of this on the animals.





Last term, year 6 wrote their own third-person narratives based on Anthony Horowitz's Alex Rider novel, Stormbreaker. They also studied the American artist, Chuck Close and created pixelated self portraits inspired by his technique.





Last term we were looking at Kevin Crossley-Holland's "Beyond Worlds" and folk lore and tales in the UK and North America. We focussed on the features of such tales and created our own stories after drama and role-playing sessions.

EYFS and KS1 Parent Reading Morning


Every Thursday from 8:40-9:10am
