


This week Magnolia have been learning about vegetables and planting seeds alongside reading the story 'The Gigantic Turnip'.





In year 1, the children have been using their knowledge from Autumn 1 to inform Beegu about their local area. The children informed Beegu about where we live, what physical and human features there are and their favorite part about Abbey wood in comparison to Beegu's hometown.






Hornbeam's humanities focus has been on the Windrush generation, with particular focus on Olive Morris. She represents the courage and fortitude of that generation. She witnessed both racism and prejudice. In the lessons we have been exploring how Olive challenged authorities using non-violent methods. The children have been fascinated by her courage and how she galvanised members of the community to fight for equality.











In year 3, we have been looking at the Roman Empire. Initially, we started off by looking at the countries that the Roman's conqueured. Building upon this, we started to look at their armies and what they made their armies stronger than their counterparts. We identified that they had two types of soldiers, the legionaires and the auxiliary soldiers. After careful scrutiny, we noticed that both types of soldiers had similarities with their weapons and their armour.

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



Year 4 are learning about the Vikings this term. We started by looking at the collapse of the Roman Empire before the Saxons became a force. Our pupils have taken on the role of budding reporters in a special news report about the Romans leaving Britain! In this engaging activity, the children stepped into the shoes of news anchors, reporters, and even ancient Roman citizens to bring history to life.

In History, Year 5 have been studying the Ancient Egyptians. We have compared them to other ancient civilisations and can identify where they are situated both in the world and on a timeline.









In humanities, children in Year 6 focused on grasping geographical concepts, particularly lines of longitude and latitude. Through interactive methods using maps and digital tools, students understand the practical significance of these coordinates in locating places on Earth. Children not only acquired geographical knowledge but also developed critical thinking skills as they ponder the implications of these coordinates on travel, trade and cultural exchange.
